ADDITIONAL INFORMATION:

The police department received 1660 calls for service from 08/01/23 – 08/31/23. 26 Adults and Juveniles were either arrested or summoned into court for various charges to include: Assault & Battery on a Police Officer with Serious Bodily Injury, B&E Building Daytime for Felony, Operating Under the Influence of Drugs, Cruelty to Animals and Leave Scene of Property Damage Accident. There were twenty seven (27) Motor Vehicle Accidents investigated, 3 of the accidents resulted in personal injury. 13 People were taken to the hospital for a Mental Health Evaluation. Officers responded to complaints that resulted in 34 Incident Reports being created for various crimes.

- All Dispatchers received refresher training and updates from the State 911 Department.
- Officers assisted with traffic for the annual Pan Mass Challenge bicycle ride.
